Facilities

All graduate business classes are held in Grainger Hall, one of the most visually appealing and technologically advanced business school facilities in the country. Amenities include three high-tech auditoriums with multimedia and broadcast capabilities, 30 classrooms, group study rooms, a café, and a courtyard.

The building provides a home for each of the MBA career specializations that make up the Wisconsin MBA, with centralized resources for MBA students, including state-of-the-art classrooms, the MBA and Master's Programs Office, the MBA Career Management Center, and breakout rooms. Grainger Hall is a student-friendly gathering space with common spaces crucial to unifying the Wisconsin School of Business community.

Learning Commons

In addition to MBA-designated spaces, an area spanning three floors was reimaged in 2018 in a joint project between the School and the UW-Madison General Library System. The donor-funded Learning Commons initiative renovated nearly 35,000 square feet in the core of Grainger Hall. The Learning Commons is home to the Huber Undergraduate Computing Lab, the Finance and Analytics Lab, five active learning classrooms, 10 breakout rooms, and numerous study areas. It is a space designed for inspiration and reflection and features extensive connectivity and artwork by Wisconsin artists.

Computer Labs

A computer lab dedicated to MBA student use is conveniently located adjacent to the MBA core classrooms. Computer hardware and software are regularly upgraded to ensure that students have access to the latest technology. There is a complimentary quota for printing provided in the MBA computer lab.





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Although the Wisconsin School of Business supports a computing lab for MBA students, it is meant to supplement your own computing resources while you are on campus. Most students stop by the computer lab daily to check their student mail folders and to see what is posted on the student organization message boards.

The Plenary Room

The Plenary Room The Plenary Room is a multipurpose room that holds 265 people for lectures, presentations, and group discussions. It also includes study tables and comfortable chairs for relaxing between classes.

Food Service

For busy students, Grainger Hall offers several food service options. The Capital Café, located on the first floor, is open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Hot sandwiches are served from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., and there is also a Peet's full-service coffee bar serving coffee, lattes, espresso drinks, and snacks.

Study Rooms

There are 12 study rooms that students can reserve for individual study or team meetings. Each study room has a table, whiteboard, and computer data ports with access to the School's network. These study rooms are located throughout the east wing of Grainger Hall.



Recreational Facilities

Students have access to the recreational facilities on campus, including the UW Natatorium (NAT), Camp Randall Sports Center (Shell), Nielsen Tennis Stadium (NTS), and the new Nicholas Recreation Center, which is scheduled to open in Fall 2020.
